A very warm welcome back to our whole Tauranga Special School community, and special greetings to our new students, their families and a number of new staff.

Thank you to our families for the very high turn out to our Wā whakakotahi - Learning Partnership Day held on Tuesday 4 February this year. The initial feedback we have received from parents and staff indicates that the meetings were very valuable in terms of meeting and greeting each other, providing updates on each student's well being, and collecting essential information. Through Storypark we put out a small survey to families for feedback as well. We received 8 responses but would like more.

We ended the 2024 school year with a student role of 118. We started this year with 121. We have two or three more students starting soon. The Ministry of Education has informed us that our maximum role capacity across all our sites is 127 students. Our own estimate was 125. We will most likely reach the maximum figure before the end of this term. We have now created a 'Waiting List', for families that approach us seeking to enrol with us. If a student was to leave, we would review our Waiting List to see if there was a student that would be best suited to the class age level and compatibility.

Erica Stanford, Education Minister, is very much in tune with our nation's 36 day specialist schools network. She knows there are Waiting Lists in many of the schools and a serious lack of satellite class provision. She supports parental choice but until more property provision is delivered, Waiting Lists will remain in place. Our Board is proactive in seeking additional satellites across the Tauranga region, but it is an extremely difficult task as 99% of the schools are at their maximum roll capacities.




Welcome Bay - Kirsty

Room 4 - Hayley


In Room 4 we have had a great start to the year with some new faces for both staff and students.

Supporting Communication at Tauranga Special School

At TSS we support our students' understanding using '**The Rule of 2'** where in addition to our spoken word we use another form of communication eg. signing, using natural gestures, coreboard, visuals or the student's communication system.



Please note for our students who are deaf the rule of two would include two visual communication forms. For our low vision students we would use systems that they can touch, or are adapted for their vision.
